


# State of Housing: Recent Economic and Housing Conditions

**Unemployment rate** in Palm Beach County has returned to pre-pandemic level of **2.6%** as of September 2022 compared to the national rate of 3.5%.

At 10.7%, the Consumer Price Index hasn't reached this level in the southeast Florida tri-county area since 1982.


At **6.25%** in Sept 2022, the **Prime Interest Rate** is at its highest since 2008.



Foreclosure filings totaled 1,204 in 2022 (through June).



#### Ratio of median housing price to median household income 2013-2022



In 2013, a median priced SF home cost 3 times median income. In 2022, a median priced SF home (\$620k) costs nearly 7 times income (\$90,300).

#### **RENTS TOO!**

To afford the \$1,578 Fair Market Rent for a 2-bedroom apartment, a tenant needs annual income of \$63,000 or \$30.29 per hour.








### Affordable Housing Programs 2020 - 2022

HED **assisted 3,204 housing units** for up to 140% of Area Median Income (AMI) through construction, acquisition, rehabilitation, and mortgage assistance using HOME, CDBG, SHIP, and a one-time infusion of CARES Act monies.

#### Since its inception:


- Over 100 participants
- Services include: Case Management, Financial Literacy, Employment Training
- Participants secured housing placements through: Rapid Re-Housing, Emergency Housing Vouchers, reconnecting with families and/or friends, and housing with no subsidies












### **Housing for Reentry Program Participants**



- 1. PBC Clerk & Comptroller to expedite the process of obtaining driver's licenses/IDs for individuals returning from incarceration to the community.
- 2. Covanta Industrial Waste Management to hire returning individuals at living wages that will aid in their ability to own a home.

**Continued Challenges**: HOA bylaws, landlords willing to house individuals with background or poor credit history, and the current cost of living.



#### 2022 Reentry Summit (Oct 5-7)

- 256 registrants
  - 172 from Florida
  - 79 from other states
  - 5 from Saipan

Allowable transitional housing cost: **FY23: \$10,000** max per reentry participant represents an increase of over 50% to better meet the housing needs of returning residents, and allowed flexibility of security and other required deposits.








#### **How Many Homeless Individuals Live in Palm Beach County?**


#### **2022 Point-In-Time Count**

## **Homeless & Housing Veterans**



9/1-9/30/22 BNL – 77 Veterans 9/1-9/30/22 AcuityList – 30 Veterans Palm Beach County is one of 105 communities that participate in the Built for Zero challenge to measurably and equitably end homelessness, with a focus on veterans.



Using a "by-name list" BNL, each veteran's needs are identified, documented, and each individual is supported from first contact all the way to achieving permanent housing.

## Fire Rescue & Community Services

The Fire Rescue Mobile Integrated Health Team often identifies challenges and communicates them to Community Services to find a solution together to meet the needs of those we mutually serve.


### **Challenges**

- Individuals who self identify as being homeless seeking assistance for medical, substance use/alcohol use disorder, mental health, or social service need through 911.
- Individuals who self identify as being homeless being discharged from the hospital without medically appropriate shelter or services.
- Individuals and families who self identify as being homeless seeking safe places to park vehicles overnight.

#### Solution

- Pilot program through Salvation Army to offer a medical respite program within the existing shelter system.
- Supply collection from community partner, Pratt and Whitney, for the development of wellness comfort kits including Homeless Outreach Team brochure, self care supplies, and COVID-19 protective items and safety reminders; The kits were distributed to St. Mary's, JFK, JFK North, and Lakeside Hospitals for distribution.

#### PBCFR MIH Program



Fire Rescue's Mobile Integrated Health Team assisted over 4,000 patients and of those, 574 of our patients identified themselves as being homeless.
